



School Reentry

NM PED Reentry Guidance Document

- Guiding Principles:
 - Prioritize the health and safety of our students, staff, and communities
 - Maximize the amount of safe, in-person learning opportunities
 - Make decisions based on science and data

 Beginning after Labor Day, all schools in the state will be able to start the school year utilizing a hybrid model of instruction

Key Changes to Guidance

- 1. Delay of start date
- 2. Update to mask guidance
- 3. Roster caps
- 4. Air filtration

COVID-19 Preparation & Response

Assembling a COVID-19 District Planning & Response Team

Assemble a COVID-19 District Planning & Response Team

- 1. Team Lead/Point of Contact
- 2. Superintendent or Charter School Leader & their Deputies
- 3. Head Nurse
- 4.HR Director
- 5. Head of Operations & Facilities
- 6. Head of Security

At Each School. Prepare & Plan

Prepare a duty list and designate a back up for each team member.

Identify an isolation area for ill students or staff.

Plan for student pick up when one large area or the entire building needs to be evacuated at once:

- 1. Pick up of students
- 2. Sending staff home

Responsibilities of the School COVID-19 Point of Contact

Collect and maintain all information about who is in each building:

- 1. Staff rosters including cell phone numbers
- 2. On-site contractor rosters
- 3. Classroom and cohort rosters
- 4. Class schedules
- 5. After school program rosters
- 6. Real-time sign-in sheets/visitor rosters
- 7. Real-time student attendance data from school administrators
- 8. Bus route rosters
- Each student's emergency contacts authorized to pick up, authorized medical care, and household member information, etc.
- 10. Up-to-date student addresses

Utilizing CARES Act Funding

PED has encouraged districts and charters to focus on closing the digital divide and purchasing PPE.


